

Most religions support donation as a demonstration of faith and love for others. If you have questions about the position of your faith, we advise you to speak to your clergy or spiritual advisers.

What do they believe?

Amish: Will consent if they believe it is for the well-being of the recipient

Assembly of God: Donation is supported but up to the individual

Baptist: Support donation as act of charity

Brethren: Adopted a resolution in 1993 encouraging

donation

Buddhism: Donation left to individual's conscience

Catholicism: See donation as an act of charity and

self-sacrifice

Church of Christ Scientist: Donation is a personal decision

Episcopal: 1982 resolution recognizes life-giving benefits of donation and encourages members to register as donors

Evangelical Covenant Church: Encourage donation and

registry decision through 1982 resolution

Greek Orthodox: Not opposed to donation as long as it is for the improvement of disease treatment/prevention

Hinduism: Donation is an individual's choice

Islam: The Fiqh Council of North America permitted donation in 2019 as long as shar'i guidelines are met

Judaism: Donation is strongly encouraged

Lutheran: A 1984 resolution states donation contributes

to the well-being of society

Mennonite: No formal position, up to the individual

Mormon: Decision to donate is an individual one

Pentecostal: Decision to donate should be up to individual

Presbyterian: Encourage and support donation

Protestantism: Encouraged but up to individual

Sikh: See donation as an act of selfless service

Seventh-Day Adventist: Strongly encourage donation

Unitarian Universalist: Organ and tissue donation widely

supported

United Church of Christ: Donation is encouraged
